



ACADEMICS


- Students are required to pass all core classes each semester in order to move on to high school

ACADEMICS



When completing the online registration form, you will have the option to choose Regular or Advanced for Math, Language Arts, Science, and Social Studies.

We encourage all students with an FSA score of 3 or higher to challenge themselves with at least one advanced course.

Counselors will look at past grades and test history to ensure each student is placed appropriately.

ELECTIVES COURSES OFFERED

Beginning Band –Students with little or no instrumental experience develop foundational instrumental technique, foundational music literacy, and aesthetic musical awareness through rehearsal, performance, and study of high-quality band literature. Instrumentalists work on the fundamentals of music notation, sound production, instrument care and maintenance, and personal and group rehearsal strategies. Public performances may serve as a culmination of specific instructional goals. Students may be required to attend and/or participate in rehearsals and performances outside the school day to support, extend, and assess learning in the classroom. This course may also require students to obtain a musical instrument (e.g., borrow, rent, purchase) from an outside source.

Beginning Orchestra - Students who have little or no experience on violin, viola, cello, bass, or harp explore highquality music literature written or transcribed for string orchestra. Study includes the development of foundational instrumental ensemble techniques, performance skills, music literacy, and aesthetic awareness. Public performances may serve as a culmination of specific instructional goals. Students may be required to attend and/or participate in rehearsals and performances outside the school day to support, extend, and assess learning in the classroom. This course may also require students to obtain a musical instrument (e.g., borrow, rent, purchase) from an outside source.

Beginning Chorus - Students with little or no choral experience develop beginning vocal technique and skills, critical and creative thinking skills, and an appreciation of music from around the world and through time. Public performances may serve as a culmination of specific instructional goals. Students may be required to attend and/or participate in rehearsals and performances outside the school day to support, extend, and assess learning in the classroom.

ELECTIVES COURSES OFFERED

Drama - Students explore the essential elements of 20th- and 21st-century music in America (e.g., jazz, rock, soul, blues) and global cultures (e.g., Latin, Bollywood, European, Asian, world drumming). Students reflect on the significance of social influences and historical events on the development of music. Participants focus on the creation, use, and performance of music; and the modes of listening, distributing, and gaining access to music. Public performances may serve as a resource for specific instructional goals. Students may be expected to attend one or more performances outside the school day to support, extend, and assess learning in the classroom.

Visual Art - Students are introduced to the rigor and routine of the art production process including planning, producing, and reflecting on art. With an emphasis on studio arts, students explore a wide range of 2D and 3D media, skills and techniques, as related to contemporary and historical art perspectives. Projects may include but not be limited to: drawing, painting, printmaking, collage, mixed media, pottery, and sculpture. Students develop technical skills, foster their expressive abilities and employ the use of the elements of art throughout the production process.

Computer Science Discoveries 1 - Computer Science Discoveries 1 introduces students to computer science as a vehicle for problem solving, communication, and personal expression. The course focuses on the visible aspects of computing and computer science and encourages students to see where computer science exists around them and how they can engage with it as a tool for exploration and expression. ELECTIVES COURSES OFFERED

Physical Education - This fitness course is designed for 6th grade students and intended to be 18 weeks in length. The purpose of this course is to provide students with the knowledge, skills, and values they need to become healthy and physically active for a lifetime. This course addresses both the health and skill-related components of physical fitness which are critical for students' success.

Career Research and Decision Making - The purpose of this course is to enable students to explore careers/career clusters and make informed career choices. Activities enable students to increase self-awareness and develop the skills needed to successfully plan for postsecondary education and the workplace. Career assessment should include interests, aptitudes, and basic skills. Work-based learning strategies appropriate for this course include job shadowing, field trips, and mentors. Work-based activities allow students to evaluate their career choices as they relate to actual careers at the worksite.

Office/Media Aide – Students will assist office/media personnel in daily activities. Grades and behavior will be considered before placement.

Bus Information

Need to know where your child's bus stop location will be for the upcoming school year??? No need to wait! You can access that information now using the Find My School tab on the Indian River County School District main website. Go to <u>www.indianriverschools.org</u>, click the FIND MY SCHOOL TAB, enter your street address. Once your zoned school appears, click it and the bus stop location appears along with AM/PM times. Bus stop locations will no longer be posted to the website.

**Students participating in open enrollment <u>are not</u> eligible for bus transportation. If no school/bus stop information appears, please call 978-8801 and choose option 2 for Routing.



Student Drop Off & Pick-up

Drop students all along this are

Car drop off in the morning

Drop off once you stop at this point or beyond

- Please pull as far forward as you can
- Once you stop, please have your student exit the vehicle at any point along the drop off zone
